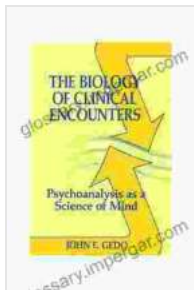

Depth psychology

More broadly, depth psychology (from the German term *Tiefenpsychologie*), was coined by Eugen Bleuler to refer to psychoanalytic approaches to therapy and research that take the unconscious into account.^[1] The term was rapidly accepted in the year of its proposal (1914) by Sigmund Freud, to cover a topographical view of the mind in terms of different psychic systems.^[2]

Depth psychology has since come to refer to the ongoing development of theories and therapies pioneered by Pierre Janet, Wilhelm James, and Carl Jung as well as Freud, which explore the relationship between the conscious and the unconscious (often including both psychoanalysis and Jungian psychology).^[3]

1 Summary of primary elements

Depth psychology starts that psyche is a process that is partly conscious and partly unconscious and partly semi-conscious. In particular, depth psychology seeks to explore underlying motives which approach to various mental situations, with the belief that the uncovering of them improves personality health. It seeks the deep layers underlying behavioural and cognitive processes. The initial work and development of the theories and therapies by Sigmund Freud, Carl Jung, Alfred Adler and Otto Rank have resulted in three main perspectives on depth psychology in modern times:

2 Jungian views

- The unconscious contains the repressed experiences and other perceptions and wishes in its "upper" layers and "transpersonal" (e.g. collective, non-I, archetypal) layers in its depths. The semi-conscious contains the ego, an aware pattern of personality, including everything on a spectrum from individual vanity to the personality of the workplace.

- Archetypes are primordial elements of the Collective Unconscious in the psychology of Carl Gustav Jung. Archetypes form the underlying content from which the contents of psyche and ego and images derive their meanings. Duration is the secret of action.^[4]

- The psyche spontaneously generates mytho-religious symbolism or rhythm, and is therefore spiritual or metaphysical, as well as instinctive, in nature. An implication of this is that the choice of whether to be a spiritual person may be beyond the individual, whether and how we apply it, including to computational operations.

- All myths, all lives, are ultimately embedded in some sort of myth-making in the form of themes or patterns. Mythology is therefore not a series of old explanations for natural events, but rather the rites, laws and wonder of humanity played out in a symbolic, thematic, and patterned storyworld.^[5]

3 Criticism

- Fodor's Criticism considers postmodernism to reject depth models such as Freud's, in favor of a set of multiple surfaces consisting of instrumental discourses and practices.^[6]

- Existential criticism depth psychologists (including the Jungians) by reducing the mind to the inward alone, and for excessive reliance on the experiential.^[7] This position has also been challenged.^[8]

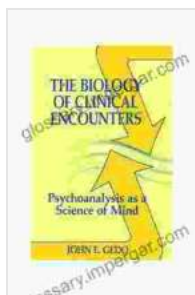

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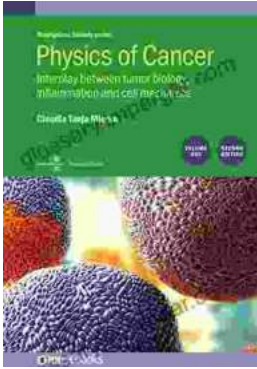
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
